Sister Patricia Chappell, SNDdeN, will be receiving the 2020 Outstanding Leadership Award from the Leadership Conference of Women Religious (LCWR).

Sr. Patty spent nearly 30 years working with many religious congregations and lay groups on diversity-racism issues, and was Executive Director of Pax Christi USA for almost 8 years. She was also one of the founding members of the Black Sisters Conference and served as its president from 1996-2001. Sr. Patty currently serves on the Leadership Team for the U.S. East-West Province.

Celebrating Sister Dorothy: Her Legacy Endures

Fifteen years ago, Notre Dame de Namur Sister Dorothy Stang was martyred in Brazil after serving there for 40 years.

Sr. Dorothy had been working with the Catholic Church's Pastoral Land Commission, fighting for the rights of rural workers and peasants on behalf of the poor and the Amazon Rain Forest. When she was shot by gunmen hired by wealthy landowners, news of her death drew attention worldwide to the causes she fought for.

Within a few years, she was honored with the United Nations Prize in the field of Human Rights. Books, movies, documentaries and even an opera now help to tell her story. Her life and work have also inspired and helped educate new generations of students about ecology, social justice and faith. She has also been formally recognized by the Vatican as a modern-day martyr.

Dorothy would be amazed at how her life and work among the poor have taken root in the lives and hearts of people in Brazil and beyond. Her legacy is all the more important today as we confront the challenge of global climate change.

Educating for Life

Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur first came to the United States from Belgium in 1840, fulfilling St. Julie Billiart's vision that her Sisters would go throughout the world to teach young people "whatever is necessary to prepare them for life." The Sisters established hundreds of schools and have educated many thousands of children and adults.

St. Patrick School in Lowell, Massachusetts, was one of the first schools opened by the Sisters on the East Coast to teach mainly children of the

Irish Catholic immigrant community. One hundred and sixty-eight years later, St. Patrick School and Educational Center is thriving. "We are still welcoming and teaching immigrant children," says principal Sr. Joanne Sullivan, "but now from many different countries and cultures." St. Patrick's commitment is to remain constant and steadfast in its original mission to meet the educational, spiritual, and human needs of the children of the people of Lowell, especially those who may be poor or new to this country.

And on the West Coast, 120 years after its founding, Moreland Notre Dame School in Watsonville,

California, was voted best private K-8 school in Santa

Cruz County. Located in a lush agricultural area with a significant Hispanic population, it serves pre-kindergarten through eighth grade students. The school, originally a boarding school for girls, was funded by Mrs. Margaret Moreland to honor her daughter who had died at a young age. Mrs. Moreland trusted the Sisters to honor her daughter's memory just as parents have continued to entrust the education of their children to the Sisters.


PRAYING TOGETHER For Our Loved Ones
